### PUBLIC NOTICE BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARKERSBURG, IOWA. ORDI-

NANCE 375 SECTION 1. Chapter 92, Section 92.03 of the Code of Ordinances of City of Parkersburg, Iowa, as amended, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

92.03: Rates and Service Outside the City: Water service shall be provided to any customer located outside the corporate limits of the City which the City has agreed to serve at 150% of the rates provided in Section 92.02. No such customer, however, will be served unless the customer shall have signed a service contract agreeing to be bound by the ordinances, rules, and regulations applying to water service established by the Council. Any person desiring city water service to property lying outside the city's corporate limits must: (A) If the property is contiguous to the city's corporate limits, annex the subject property into the city as a condition precedent

to receiving such water service and (B) If the property is not contiguous to the city's corporate limits, agree to be bound by the City of Parkersburg's Contract for Water Service to require voluntary annexation upon becoming contiguous to the city's corporate limits. (Code of Iowa, Sec. 364.4 & 384.84)

SECTION 2. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval, and publication as provided by law SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY

CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 1. Chapter 95, Section 95.06 of the Code of Ordinances of City of Parkersburg, Iowa, as amended, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

95.06 Rates and Service Outside the City: The owners of property outside the corporate limits of the City so situated that it may be served by the City sewer system may apply to the Council for permission to connect to the public sewer upon the terms and conditions stipulated by resolution of the Council. Sewer service shall be provided to such customers at 150% of the rates provided in Section 99.02. No such customer, however, will be served unless the customer shall have signed a service contract agreeing to be bound by the ordinances, rules, and regulations applying to sewer service established by the Council. Any person desiring city sewer service to property lying outside the city's corporate limits must: (A) If the property is contiguous to the city's corporate limits, annex the subject property into the city as a condition precedent to receiving such sewer service and (B) If the property is not contiguous to the city's corporate limits, agree to be bound by the City of Parkersburg's Contract for Sewer Service to require voluntary annexa-

tion upon becoming contiguous to the city's corporate limits. (Code of lowa, Sec. 364.4 & 384.84) SECTION 2. Chapter 99, Section

99.02 of the Code of Ordinances of City of Parkersburg, Iowa, as amended, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

99.02 Rate: Each customer shall pay sewer service charges in the amount of eighty-five percent (85%) of the bill for water and water service attributable to the customer for the property served, but in no event less than thirty dollars (\$30.00) per guarter; provided that customers outside of the corporate limits shall pay the rate determined in Section 95.06. (Code of Iowa, Sec. 384.84)

This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval, and publication as provided by law

WHEREAS, one of the obligations of the Developer relates to employment retention and/or creation; and WHEREAS, Chapters 15A and 403, Code of Iowa, authorize counties to make grants for economic development in furtherance of the objectives of an urban renewal project and to appropriate such funds and make such expenditures as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of said Chapters, and to levy taxes and assessments for such purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the Agreement is in the best interests of the County and the residents thereof and that the performance by the County of its obligations thereunder is a public undertaking and purpose and in furtherance of the Plan and the Urban Renewal Law and, further, that the Agreement and the County's performance thereunder is in furtherance of appropriate economic development activities and objectives of the County within the meaning of Chapters 15A and 403, Code of Iowa, taking into account any or all of the factors set forth in Chapter 15A, Code of lowa, to wit:

a. Businesses that add diversity to or generate new opportunities for the lowa economy should be favored over those that do not.

b. Development policies in the dispensing of the funds should attract, retain, or expand businesses that produce exports or import substitutes, or which generate tourism-

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related activities.

c. Development policies in the dispensing or use of the funds should be targeted toward businesses that generate public gains and benefits. which gains and benefits are war ranted in comparison to the amount of the funds dispensed.

d. Development policies in dispensing the funds should not be used to attract a business presently located within the state to relocate to another portion of the state unless the business is considering in good faith to relocate outside the state or unless the relocation is related to an expansion which will generate significant new job creation. Jobs created as a result of other jobs in similar lowa businesses being displaced shall not be considered direct jobs for the purpose of dispensing funds; and

That the performance by the County of its obligations under the Agreement, including but not limited to making of grants to the Developer in connection with the development of the Development Property under the terms set forth in the Agreement, be and is hereby declared to be a public undertaking and purpose and in furtherance of the Plan and the Urban Renewal Law and, further, that the Agreement and the County's performance thereunder is in furtherance of appropriate economic development activities and objectives of the County within the meaning of Chapters 15A and 403, Code of Iowa, taking into account the factors set forth therein.

That the form and content of the Agreement, the provisions of which are incorporated herein by reference, be and the same hereby are in all respects authorized, approved and confirmed, and the Chairperson and the County Auditor be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed to execute, attest, seal and deliver the Agreement for and on behalf of the County in substantially the form and content now before this meeting, but with such changes, modifications, additions or deletions therein as shall be approved by such officers, and that from and after the execution and delivery of the Agreement, the Chairperson and the County Auditor are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such docu-
